Minutes Approval	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> June 22, 2017
Presentations	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Mike Rotar from RESPEC provided an overview of the update to the Hazard Mitigation Plan and Community Wildfire Protection Plan that is underway. The critical meetings will take place around February. It is very important for agencies to participate in this process so we accurately capture our hazards and identify potential projects. This cycle we will be identifying community specific hazards for the mitigation plan and intend to update the wildland urban interface boundary currently in the 2006 CWPP. Sean O’Callaghan provided an overview of the National Flood Insurance Program Community Rating System that the County, Bozeman and Three Forks participate in. He also presented a summary of the flood mitigation work conducted in the past year, which those present endorsed.
Action Items	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Betty Kalakay presented an overview and update on the Chempack. There was good discussion about the likelihood of this tool being utilized. General consensus is that due to the types of drugs, timeframes for administration, and speed to access them there is likely little benefit locally in the current configuration. Betty also provided an update on the suspicious substance policy. There was a recent incident that identified some portions of the flow chart that needed to be updated. Ultimately there was discussion about lack of jurisdictional clarity on many of these sorts of incidents. The group felt it was worth spending some time to update the process and try to clean up some of these gray areas. Betty will lead a small work group and those interested should contact here to participate. Patrick Lonergan presented the draft state preparedness survey for Gallatin County for 2017. He provided a quick summary of how he responded to the survey and the challenges with how the state is conducting this process. If he doesn’t receive feedback in the next day he will submit it to the state.

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Patrick provided an overview of a project that is underway to submit a regional grant to develop deployable Mass Casualty Incident resources for treatment and transport. Patrick led a quick discussion about the 2018 Homeland Security Grants. We'll need to prioritize those as a county again, so people should be thinking about what they want to do. We'll discuss grant proposals at the December/ January AHAD meeting. Applications will likely open at the beginning of January and close around the end of February. The group is good keeping the current schedule for the 2018 AHAD dates. We will move the December meeting to an alternate date.
Updates	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Patrick provided an update on updates to the Community Notification System that adds alerting to Google devices and geofences that can alert new people that enter the alerting area. He also discussed the limitations of the Wireless Emergency Alert System with the spotlight on Sonoma County for not utilizing it. Patrick reported that he is still working with the Sheriff's Office on setting up an Active Shooter Course for EMS & Fire. There was then discussion about wanting a fire-law discussion to clarify process here in Gallatin County. Patrick will schedule this. As follow up to previous AHAD meetings, Patrick reported that a good tour of the Phillips66 Bulk Terminal was conducted this summer. The emergency plans for both Phillips66 and ExxonMobil were also received. Patrick provided an FYI that Montana DES is starting to pass on Emergency Management Assistance Compact requests. Gallatin County did respond to a fire request to California that was ultimately cancelled. Montana still has a lot of work to do on their internal process to make this work.
