Re: April 10, 2018 calcium carbonate (deicer) spill in violation of the Montana Solid Waste Management Act [CVID 20535]

Dear Mr. Hillman:

On April 11, 2018, the Enforcement Program (ENF) of the Montana Department of Environmental Quality (DEQ) received information that an estimated 600 gallons of calcium carbonate spilled to the environment on Highway 191, one mile north of the Greek Creek Campground in Gallatin County, Montana.

As of the date of this letter, ENF has not received any written documentation that indicates the spill site has been fully assessed, and all calcium carbonate-affected media has been remediated and properly disposed.

This letter is to inform Acela Trucking that the spill of calcium carbonate to the environment is an improper disposal of a solid waste, and therefore constitutes a violation of the Montana Solid Waste Management Act (SWMA).

Under the SWMA and the Administrative Rules of Montana (ARM):

- It is unlawful to dispose of solid waste except as permitted. *See* Section 75-10-212, Montana Code Annotated (MCA).
- Disposal is defined as the discharge, injection, deposit, dumping, spilling, leaking, or placing of any solid waste into or onto the land. *See* Section 75-10-203(3), MCA.
- Contaminated soil means soil, rocks, dirt, or earth that has been made impure by contact, commingling, or consolidation with petroleum hydrocarbons. *See* ARM 17.50.502(8).
- Waste is defined as useless, unwanted, or discarded materials in any physical form. *See* ARM 17.50.502(41).
- Contaminated soils are Group II wastes that require disposal at a Class II solid waste management system. *See* ARM 17.50.503.

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In order to return to compliance, ENF requests that the following corrective actions be conducted:

- By May 20, 2018, hire a qualified environmental consultant and complete assessment and remedial actions, including proper disposal of all calcium carbonate-impacted media. Please provide a copy of this letter to your environmental consultant and have them contact me prior to initiating on-site activities. It is recommended that a copy of this letter also be provided to your insurance company as well.

As this incident occurred on a public right-of-way, an encroachment permit (Permit) may be required. For information on obtaining a Permit, please contact the Montana Department of Transportation Maintenance Area Office at:

- By July 20, 2018, complete assessment and remedial actions, and submit a cleanup report meeting ENF's Standardized Cleanup Report format. Please refer to this document for information on submitting the cleanup report to ENF.

Please note that cleanup reports not submitted in the Standardized Cleanup Report format or providing all requested information will not be accepted by ENF.

Effective January 1, 2018, ENF only accepts electronic copies of the Standardized Cleanup Report (Report). Reports should be in .PDF format and submitted via email or the Montana File Transfer Service. Please note that state email is limited to 10 megabytes.
